From the desk of RKA....

Happy Spring to all of you!!! Yes, it is here! This month is Line Worker Appreciation Month and specifically April 11, 2022, is Line Worker Appreciation Day. My article is specifically geared to our line workers and their dedication to our coop.

I know that you have noticed the Wheatland REA crews out and about, working on power lines

and other electrical equipment in our territory. It is no secret that their job is tough but it is a job that is essential and must be done, often in challenging conditions. Here are some interesting facts about electric line workers that I would like to share with you.

The work can be heavy, in more ways than one. Did you know the equipment and tools that a line worker carries while climbing a pole can weigh up to 50 pounds? That is the same as carrying six gallons of water. Speaking of poles, our line workers are required to climb poles ranging anywhere from 30 to 85 feet tall. Needless to say, if you have a fear of heights, this might not be the best career path for you.

Line workers must be committed to their career because it is not just a job. It is a lifestyle. The long and ever present danger can truly take a toll. In fact, being a line worker is listed in the top 10 most dangerous jobs in the U.S.

Line workers sometimes work non-traditional hours and outdoors in difficult conditions. While the job does not require a college degree, it does require technical skills, years of training, and hands-on learning. Did you know to become a journeyman line worker that it can take more than 8,000 hours of training (or about four years)? That is because working with high-voltage equipment requires specialized skills, experience, and an ongoing mental toughness. Shortcuts are not an option, and there is no room for error in this line of work.

Despite the many challenges, Wheatland REA's line workers are committed to powering our territory. During severe weather events that bring major power outages (remember March 2021?), the line workers are among the first ones called. They must be ready to leave the comfort of their home and families unexpectedly, and they do not return until the job is done, sometimes many days later. That is why the line worker's family is also dedicated to service. They understand the importance of the job.

Nationwide, there are approximately 120,000 electric line workers. Here at the REA, we have 15 employees that are line workers and other operational employees that are responsible for keeping power flowing 24/7, 365 days a year. To do this, they maintain 1,805.95 miles of power lines across four counties and 4,186.67 square miles.

Being a line worker may not seem like a glamorous job, but it is essential to the life of our community. Without the exceptional dedication and commitment of these hardworking men, we simply would not have the reliable electricity that we depend on for everyday life.

So, thank you, Wheatland REA line workers! We so appreciate all that you do!!
