



The season is changing! I woke this morning to a pretty good frost on the cars which led to the question, "What do I have to do before the heavy freeze?!" This wake-up call happens every year!




If you have seen much of the news lately, you have heard the issues with supply shortages of nearly everything. Many of the reasons for the shortages in someway tie to shortages of manpower. Shortages of people in manufacturing plants. Shortages in transportation workers. Shortages in retail stores. Shortages across all parts of the supply chain. The REA is not exempt for the impacts of these shortages. Virtually all of our material and equipment has lead-times that are unreasonable. Material that normally has lead-times of a couple of weeks, now has estimated delivery times of over a year! Simple parts necessary to connect a new home are over a year out! We have been able to stay ahead of the shortages for the most part, but this will catch up to us at some point.

Now, as to why there is a shortage of manpower, I will go a little political in my thoughts and say the "government" needs to stay out of the game. Throughout the "pandemic", the government has continued to pay people to stay home more than they did in the past, until recently. This encouragement to not work and provide these entitlement programs has caused the shortages across the supply chain and in many industries. As far back as in the writing of the Constitution of the United States, people such as James Madison have said that bad things happen when the "government" gets involved in the redistribution of money, which is exactly what the unemployment stipends are, and they have been increased since the beginning of the pandemic. There are no provisions in our constitution for the federal government to be involved in the redistribution of money. I could continue on my soapbox, but let me just say, if this shortage situation is to end, we need to get people back to work and stop doling out our tax dollars for people not to work.

I think the quickest and easiest way to inform someone of why it is valuable to be a part of a cooperative is to share with them the 7 Cooperative Principles:



- Voluntary and Open Membership Anyone can join a co-op; no discrimination involved.
- Democratic Member Control Members control the business by voting. Members' Economic Participation-All co-op members invest in their cooperative.
- Autonomy & Independence Co-ops never compromise their autonomy or democratic member control.
- Education, Training, and Information Co-ops provide these things to their members so they can contribute effectively to the success of the co-op.
- Cooperation Among Cooperatives Co-ops believe working together is the best strategy to empower their members and build a stronger co-op economy.
- Concern for Community Co-ops are community minded by contributing to the development of their communities by sourcing and investing locally.

If you would like more information about these 7 important principles, please give us a call. We would be more than happy to explain any of them to you.

During the month of October, you should be receiving your capital credit allocation statement for the calendar year 2020. This is to let you know what was allocated to your account for that year based on operating margins for the year and what you paid to us in energy \$\$. ELECTRICAL SAFETY TIPS FOR HUNTERS

*Take notice of posted warning signs and keep clear of electrical equipment.

*Do not shoot at or near power lines or insulators.

*Know where power lines and equipment are located on the land where you hunt.

*Be especially careful in wooded areas where power lines may not be as visible.

*Do not place deer stands on utility poles or climb poles. Energized lines and equipment can conduct electricity to anyone who comes in contact with them, causing shock or electrocution.

*Do not place decoys on power lines or other utility equipment. Any non-electrical equipment attached to a pole can pose an obstruction and serious hazards to our line crew.

Top arrow... **Your meter**

If the meter readout window is blank, you have no power to your service. <u>CALL US.</u>

Bottom arrow...

Your breakers

If the readout window is on, check your breakers below it. If they are in the "off" position, try to reset them. If they

will not reset, the problem is somewhere in your wire or equipment. We are not allowed to work on the member-owner's side of the service and you need to call an electrician. One last step, which should probably be your first step. Before going out to your meter, check the breakers in your home's breaker panel.


REBATES
